Government Shivnath Science College, Rajnandgaon located on the Gourav Path was established in 1986 by the Chhattisgarh State Government to cater the need of higher education of the urban and nearby rural areas. It is affiliated to Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur. Since 2015-16 the College is getting affiliation gradually to Durg University, Durg. The college has been gearing up with adequate mechanism and adopting new pathways for achieving the goals of excellence. The students admitted to the college belong to heterogeneous and rural background. About 90% students both male & female belong to SC/ST/OBC category and most of them belong to BPL group. The college with an area of about 10 acres has most of the modern facilities. The college has completed 25 years of its glorious service in 2011.

Initially the College started with single faculty of science. With growing demand the faculty of Commerce and Arts were incorporated in 2012-13.

For the first time our college is submitting its SSR for assessment and accreditation by NAAC for the year 2016-17, a document that faithfully confirms to NAAC guidelines and records its vision, mission and innovative initiative in its pursuit for excellence. The mission of our institution is to empower the youth with higher education, ethical and moral values.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

I. Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. We offer B.A, B.Sc, B.Com, courses at degree level. Since the academic session 2016-17 the college has started Post graduate courses in Chemistry and Mathematics, and Post graduate diploma course in Computer Application. The University curriculum is strictly followed. We encourage the holistic development of students instilling moral, social and ethical values to make them socially responsible citizens.

II. Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Admissions in all courses/programmes are made as per the government/ university guidelines. Transparency is maintained by admission committees. Annual teaching plans are prepared by faculty members. Teaching diaries are periodically checked by the HODs / principal to monitor the curriculum covered. Special classes for advanced learners and remedial tutorial classes for slow learners are arranged regularly. Internal assessment is done to monitor the progress of students. College organizes programs to sensitize the faculty and students on gender and environmental issues. Communal harmony is observed in the college.

III. Research, Consultancy and Extension

In this area we need to improve a lot. Due to lack of research facility in science no research work is being carried out at present. Six teachers are Ph.D. and one teacher is registered for Ph.D. Two teachers are approved guides in the faculty of commerce and Political Science for research work. Several teachers have a number of research publications to their credit. We have a research committee which promotes research culture and develops awareness for researches amongst the faculty members and students so as to encourage them to participate in seminars and workshops etc.

The college has NSS wing and Red Cross Society for students. Faculty members actively participate with students in the activities of NSS and Red Cross to educate, promote health and environment awareness, hygiene, cleanliness amongst the rural mass. Camps for Blood donation, AIDS awareness programmes are organised from time to

time. Educational tours, Social and economic surveys, visits to various institutions like Old Age Home, Schools of specially abled and Orphanage are organised to create a sense social responsibility. The college also celebrates various international days viz. Constitution Day, Ozone Day, Yoga Day, World Food Day, Teachers Day, Hindi Day. Various other programmes like Voter Awareness, History of Freedom Fighters 'Azaadi ke Sattar Saal – Yaad karo Kurbani' are organised from time to time.

IV. Infra Structure and Learning Resources

Infra Structure plays key role in effective and efficient completion of educational activities. College has functional 14 class rooms equipped with furniture and 5 laboratories for UG students. 14 more classrooms are being constructed - 08 under RUSA Plan and 06 under State Government Plan. An Auditorium has also been sanctioned by the State Government. A Seminar Hall is under construction with help of MLA Fund. MLA has also funded the construction of fence of the college garden. The whole college is connected with internet facility and we are planning for Wi-Fi campus. We have one high-tech class room equipped with LCD projector is available for computer aided teaching to enrich the teaching learning experience with audio visual effect. There is provision for spacious three acres play ground and one eco-friendly garden accompanying Botanical plants and medicinal plants. The college has well equipped library containing more than 13250 books on various subjects. Uninterrupted power supply and pure drinking water supply is maintained by the college. The college has a water harvesting system and is likely to complete waste water management very soon to make the campus clean and green.

V. Student Support and Progression

The college has a Student's council, representing the voice of students, and serving as a link between the principal and students. Best student in various fields is awarded every year. Student Grievance Redressal Cell effectively functions in the college. Participation of students in extra and co curricular activities is promoted by the committee members. Career Counselling Cell helps them to choose better career for both personal and professional growth. Some new initiatives like Carrier Guidance Classes, coaching for competitive examination and short term professional courses have been started in the college so that the students can perform better in these examination and can select proper carrier.

VI. Governance, Leadership and Management

College is achieving new heights under the able guidance of teachers, office staff, and suggestions from parents. Policies of Government are implemented through various committees. IQAC and HODs offer a platform to present, discuss and formulate policies and administrative planning for the smooth governance. Main resources for implementation of policies are government budget, Jan Bhagidari fund, RUSA and UGC grant.

VII. Innovations and Best Practices

- Empowering the youth with higher education, computer literacy and moral values.
- Induction programme for new students is held in the beginning of the session.
- Saraswati Pooja is performed on the Basant Panchmi.
- Homage and tribute is paid to local martyrs on Independence Day and Republic Day ceremony.
- Communal harmony is observed in the college community "Sarva Dharma Sadbhavana" is promoted.
- Value education classes are held to nurture the moral and ethical values in students.
- Special classes are held for meritorious students and tutorial classes are conducted for weak students.
- Plantation is done by NSS students and college staff in the month of July and August every year to make the campus green and to develop sense of green ecology under 'Hariyar Mahavidyalaya' Scheme.
- Use of bicycle is encouraged in the college to control the pollution. Most of the students of the college use bicycles.
- Staff member and students are made aware to conserve electricity.
- In order to make the college premises plastic free zone the college has created a group of students known as 'Swacchata Mitra'.
- The college has a garden which has been developed by the staff and the maintenance is done by both staff and students.

Strength

- College has around 10.00 acres of land which is sufficient to develop infrastructure as per the growing need under the norms of government.
- The college has a dedicated and competent faculty who are always ready walk that extra mile to mentor the students. More than 75% of the teaching staff are Ph.D.s and several teachers have publications to their credit. The teaching learning process moves beyond the confines of the classrooms and teachers willingly make themselves available to the students even after the mandatory teaching sessions.
- All round personality is the hallmark of education at out college and what is learned within the classroom is complemented by what is done together outside of them.
- Approximately 90% students belong to weaker section viz. SC, ST, OBC including sufficient number of girl students, and the college is highly sensitive for their educational development.

- Value education classes are run to enhance the moral and ethical values in the student.
- Playground is available for volley ball, cricket, athletics like long jump, high jump, kho-kho, kabaddi etc.
- Active NSS unit consisting of 100 students.
- Communal harmony in the college campus.
- The college has eco-friendly garden with Botanical and medicinal plants.
- College has boundary wall, which safeguards from outside interferences and disputes.

Weakness

- Lack of space resulting in inadequate infrastructural facilities is the major handicap
 for the college. Non availability of the modern auditorium and hinders the college
 in organising seminars and workshops.
- The college has no hostel or residential facility for students and staff.

- A sizable number of teachers are working on temporary basis.
- Insufficient number of class rooms.
- Laboratories are not well furnished and equipped with apparatus.

Opportunity

- The college has the potential and immense scope for new courses.
- Opportunities to run career oriented courses.
- The college building is in the process of renovation and up gradation with ongoing construction of Auditorium and classrooms.
- For professional and economic development of faculty training sessions and workshops shall be organised along with inter-institutional tie-ups.

At the onset of the academic session each of the departments prepares its academic calendar. The teachers feel duty-bound to adhere to this calendar. As per the government rule, each and every teacher has to maintain his/her daily teaching diary. The system gives the college administration a regular opportunity to monitor the implementation of the curriculum.

At the UG level annual system and PG Level Semester System of examination is followed. At both the levels, all efforts are made to complete the curriculum in the prescribed time-frame of the academic session. The teachers try their best to teach their subjects in a qualitative manner.

The focus is on the qualitative teaching of the curriculum components. To evaluate the learning outcome periodic internal tests, Seminars, unit tests, quarterly exams, model tests & field works are conducted.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

All our teachers are quality-conscious and they dutifully discharge their teaching responsibilities. Newly appointed teachers are given opportunities to attend faculty development programmes like Orientation and Refresher Courses. The senior teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops in their respective subjects to keep themselves updated.

About more than half of our regular faculty members hold Ph. D. degree in their subjects. College has two registered Supervisors for Ph.D in Commerce and Political Science. Our guest teachers who have been selected to teach here are also well qualified as per the UGC norms.

Some of our teachers, Dr. Nirmala Umre (Economics), Mrs. Nirmala Jain (Mathematics), Dr. A.N. Makhija (Commerce), are members of Boards of Studies of the affiliating university in their respective subject. They actively participate in Board meetings and give their suggestions in designing the curriculum.

The college follows the guidelines of the university for the effective implementation of the curriculum.

The college has a rich library having about 13251 books and subscribed to a number of journals. This works as a strong support for implementation of the curriculum.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college holds regular meetings where the teachers discuss issues concerning effective implementation of the curriculum.

As far as possible, the teachers use ICT in the teaching process and the students are encouraged and involved in such teaching-learning process. Periodic training programmes are also conducted to facilitate teachers to understand new developments in ICT. The college has sufficient internet connectivity.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The curriculum assigned by the affiliating university is discussed in detail among the teachers and students. The teachers divide the curriculum into monthly segments for effective teaching in classrooms. During the lectures efforts are made by the teachers to involve the students in attentive learning through interactions with them. The learners are always encouraged to ask questions and seek explanations.

Where necessary and within the resources available, the teachers use ICT for better teaching results. The college has facilities of internet, computers, Xerox machines, LCD projector and Smart Boards to help the teachers and students to deliver and grasp the curricular content in a better way. As mentioned earlier, we have a well-stocked library and efforts are made for regular enrichment of the library study resources. The students are guided by the faculty members towards the value of using library for their academic benefit.

The College organises the Induction Programme for the freshers to apprise them about the month wise break up of syllabus, pattern of examination, academic audit & feedback system. Apart from the academic aspect, the students are also informed about Anti-Ragging Rules, NSS, Red-Cross, sports and cultural activities.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum

As far as interactions with the affiliating university are concerned, the college fully follows the curriculum designed by it. Besides, all its instructions regarding the implementation of the curriculum, evaluation of the students and monthly / half-yearly / annual examinations are followed strictly. The teachers who are Members of University Boards of Studies in their subjects interact with the university in their discussions on the curriculum framing.

At present, there is no interaction of this college with any research body. But our teachers are research conscious and try their best to send research proposals to funding agencies like UGC. Apart from our Library, we also have got permission to use the Library of the lead College, Govt. Digvijay P.G. Autonomous College. Since P.G. in Chemistry has started this year only and we don't have a well equipped laboratory at present, we have got permission to use the laboratory of Govt. Digvijay P.G. Autonomous College, Rajnandgaon.

As regards networking and interactions with the industry, we have at present no networking and interaction with any industrial unit as such. But our college is active in making our students aware of the job market requirements. We try to orient them towards entrepreneurship and self- employment. The college has a regular placement cell which offers updated information to students about needs of companies; and regularly sends students to recruitment drives at nearby venues. The Commerce and Economics departments also organize occasional lectures and workshops in this regard. Teachers also try to give information and guidance about job opportunities in the industrial sector.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Principal Dr. S.S. Baghel is a member of the Govt. Digvijay College P.G. Autonomus College, Rajnandgaon Board of Studies. The HOD (Maths) Mrs. Nirmala jain and the HOD (Economics) Dr. Nirmala umre are members of the Pt. R.S.U., Raipur Board of Studies of their respective subjects. Similarly Dr. A.N. Makhija(Commerce), is member of Board of Studies in Durg University, Durg. They regularly attend the meetings of Board of Studies, thereby facilitating improvement of syllabi and curriculum framework. Other senior professors also help in forming the syllabus of various autonomous colleges by virtue of being members of their board of studies.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

At present no faculty member of this college is engaged in developing any course under the purview of any university other than our affiliating university.

However, to make our students aware of environmental needs, this year we have introduced a small project for our students (Ist Year Graduation Level) to make a survey report of their village or ward along with suggestions, regarding cleanliness, sanitation and plantation. They have also been asked to make a group of five students and donate one flower pot with plant to the college.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Daily Teaching Diary is maintained by every teacher in which he/she records the teaching work done by him/her. Just after the end of each month the principal goes through the diary and signs on it. The HOD's also go through the diaries maintained by his/her colleagues.

In the IQAC meetings the teaching aspect of the curriculum is discussed. Feedback taken from the students is analysed in the meeting and good suggestions are applied/implemented for the purpose of teaching.

We are running PGDCA course under self finance scheme.

At present, this college does not offer programmes for twinning or dual degree.

This college offers P.G. degree course in the faculties of Science and UG degree course in the faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce. At the UG level in Arts the students can avail of the flexibility to choose any three of the subjects of History, Political Science, Economics, and Sociology. At the UG level in Science, the students have the freedom to opt either the Biology stream or the Maths stream as per their choice in HSSC Exam.

In case of the compulsory subject of Environmental Studies at the UG level (for all the three faculties), the students have the flexibility to pass it in any of the three years.

Wherever necessary, the college tries to organize Special classes for the weak students.

The students are admitted strictly on the basis of merit list prepared by the admission committee. Adequate participation of all the weaker sections and women is ensured as per

government rules. Presently thirty seats have been sanctioned for Computer Science. The curriculum is designed by the university. Every student is required to pay a fee of Rs five thousand per annum. The part time teachers are appointed as per UGC norms and they are paid Rs. Nine Thousand per month.

For PGDCA course, there are 20 seats sanctioned. Admission is done on merit basis. The Fee for the course is Rs. 9010/- per annum. The part time teachers appointed as per UGC norms and they are paid Rs. Nine thousand per month.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The college does not provide any skill oriented programme at present.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The assigned curriculum of each and every subject is taught in classrooms and completed within the stipulated timeframe. As measures to supplement the university's curriculum, some effective efforts are made throughout the academic session. These are:

The college organizes debates on currently relevant topics. Besides debates, quiz competitions on general knowledge are also organized to attract the students toward general awareness. Every Saturday, the Commerce students are taken to Banks, Post Office, Railway Reservation Counter, Income Tax & Commercial Tax Department to get basic knowledge in these areas. The students are encouraged for touching also taken for Industrial Visit and Market Survey and they prepare the report on the survey. The experts are invited for entrepreneurship development and Yoga sessions.

All departments organize lectures of subject experts. Such lectures help the students

to understand the syllabus in a better and richer way.

As our objective is to produce disciplined and morally responsible citizens and strongly equipped in academic terms, the NSS unit with the co-operation of the faculty of the college does its best in this regard through extension activities on people related issues.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Workshops are organized by the concerned departments to make the students aware of the requirements of the job market, the opportunities that are there and the preparation potential of their subjects. Special lectures are also organized to give information and sort of training required in connection with jobs and employment.

The college has a Career Guidance Cell which works for the employment-related benefit of the students.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

This institution is quite sensitive to the gender issues related with the staff members and students. A special cell has been formed for addressing issues related to harassment of women.

There is an environment-conscious campus which is green with trees and plants in sufficient numbers. The college is located near gifts of nature like a lake and a nature park.

Special case is taken to teach Environmental Studies as a compulsory subject at the Under Graduate level.

Human Rights are the prime concern for us. For this there is an Anti-ragging cell which is very vigilant.

In the history of this institution, any incident of ragging has never occurred.

The local legal authorities are invited to the college to deliver lectures for legal awareness to the staff and students.

The college offers Computer Science as a self-financing course to students of mathematics, and PGDCA for any graduate student.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes

offered to ensure holistic development of students?

• Moral and ethical values

As far as specific courses/programmes on moral and ethical values are concerned, at present no such courses/programmes are offered by the college. However, the college organizes occasional lectures on the teachings of nation builders and philosophers like Swami Vivekananda. During such lectures the students learn about the moral and ethical values. The college follows a calendar regarding celebrating jayantis of great leaders and other special days. On such occasions the students and staff find opportunities to learn and share moral and ethical values.

• Better career options

At the UG level the college offers Environmental Studies as a compulsory subject with the purpose of inculcating among the students proper awareness and sensitivity regarding the environment-related issues facing the country and the world.

• Community Orientation

The NSS unit of the college organizes regular out-reach camps in nearby Rampur (Block Dongargaon) village to orient the students toward community service. Besides these camps, the unit also organizes extension programmes on community-related problems. The college has adopted a village and various awareness programmes, like Save Girl Child, removal of superstitions, cleanliness, sanitation, plantation etc. The college organizes career oriented lectures and work-shops for skill development.

The college organised 7 days Computer Skill Development Programme for teaching and office staff. The college organized the Spoken English coaching classes and competitive coaching classes along with personality development sessions for the students.

As the college runs University affiliated courses, the feedback from the stakeholders is communicated to the University through members of the Board of Studies in meetings held for the purpose of curriculum.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

At present, 2 teachers, Mrs. Nirmala jain(Maths) & Dr. Nirmala umare (Economics) are members of the Board of Studies under our affiliating university, Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. In this capacity they attend the meetings and give suggestions there. Dr. A.N. Makhija (Commerce) is member of Board of Studies in Durg University, Durg.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. A format has been prepared for taking feedback from students and stakeholders. The results are analysed and discussed and communicated to the University through members of the Board of Studies in meetings held for the purpose of curriculum.

During the last four years the following programmes and courses have been introduced by the college: M.Sc. (Two Years PG Course) in Chemistry, M.Sc. (Two Years PG Course) in Mathematics, PGDCA (One Year Course).

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The college plans to send proposals to the govt/university for introducing some new joboriented courses.

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Well in advance of the commencement of each academic session, the college prepares a prospectus which is given to all the students seeking admission along with the Admission Application Form. This prospectus contains all the relevant information regarding the rules and regulations, fee structure, faculty positions, courses/programmes offered, anti-ragging provisions, etc. Online admission in first year has been started from this session. CHIPS sends the merit list keeping in view the reservation policy. The prepared list is displayed on notice board and uploaded on web site.

The admission process is quite transparent. The Admission Guidelines issued by the Higher Education department of the government of Chhattisgarh are strictly followed. The admission process follows a schedule. The dates for issuance of application forms and their submission are announced well in advance. Admissions to all the classes are given on the basis of marks obtained in the previous qualifying examination. For this purpose merit lists are prepared and displayed on the notice board. The rules regarding reservation for the different categories, weight ages for different achievements of the admission seekers and the proximity of their homes to the college are followed as stipulated in the government guidelines. The admission work takes place under the supervision of admission committees.

Every precaution is taken to ensure adherence to rules and transparency in the admission process. The state government has enacted 'Lok Sewa Guarantee Adhiniyam' provisions which are applicable to the services provided by the college.

The college follows the admission rules of the state government. Thus all the admissions to all the programmes/courses offered by the college are given on the basis of marks obtained in the respective qualifying examinations. There is no other basis. The

Reservation policy of the state government is followed. Weight ages for the stipulated achievements in different areas like sports, NCC, etc. are given as per provision in rules.

Being a government institution, the admission policy and process are those that are determined by the state government. The present policy ensures that the college caters to the needy sections of the area satisfactorily. As mentioned in the Preface, this college serves largely the higher education needs of the SC/ST and OBC categories. These sections are in need of an institution of higher education which serves their needs at the optimum level of its functioning. The present policy of admission goes a long way in fulfilling this purpose.

concerned, there is no reservation of seats as such; but the college has an encouraging provision of financial assistance by way of BPL scholarships.





2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

As per the Chhattisgarh state government reservation rules which are followed by the college, three per cent of the available seats for each of the category of admission seekers is reserved for the differently abled students. This reservation rule is strictly followed at the time of giving admissions.

The college is sensitive to their needs after they get admitted to the college. The campus has ramps made for their easy and smooth movement. Whenever needs arise, the college arranges writers for the blind students during the examinations.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Wherever required, members of the admission committees assess the knowledge and skill level of the students before the commencement of the programmes through a sort of interviews with them.

Through such oral interactions weak students get an idea about the coming difficulties on the way of the programmes of study, and the required level of commitment and labour.

The teachers thus also get an idea about the comparatively weaker and brighter kinds of students, which help them to do their teaching work in accordance with their different requirements. The slow learners and advanced learners are identified and tutorials are arranged for slow learners.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The college tries to bridge the gap in knowledge of the weaker students in different subjects through various methods.

Weaker students and slow learners are identified and given extra attention with the purpose to make them able to catch up with other students of the class. Special tutorials and classes are organized as per need.

As one of the efforts in this regard, brighter students are called upon and encouraged to help their weaker classmates.

For the weaker students simplified versions of study materials like books and notes are recommended and given by the teachers.

There is provision for books and stationery materials to be given to SC/ST students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Our institution is always conscious of its responsibilities towards the issues of women, staff and students, social inclusion, environment and socio-cultural issues like discipline, respect for the human rights for each other and anti-ragging culture on the campus.

A special Gender Sensitization Committee ensures equal treatment to all. A new plan by UGC to enrol Gender Champions and facilitating their role in ensuring equality is being implemented from this session. In the staff council meetings such issues are regularly discussed.

In informal meetings and discussions among the staff and students the importance of these issues are emphasized.

The college has a cell to prevent harassment of women. The college also has an Anti-ragging committee; whose phone numbers are prominently displayed for all students to ensure quick contact in case of emergency.

Debates on issues of women are organized.

The NSS unit of the college organizes camps where issues of women and environment are discussed and acted upon. An exhibition on medicinal plants was recently organized, and the plants have been given a proper place in the botanical garden in the premises.

The college offers Environmental Studies as a compulsory subject at the UG level of all the three faculties.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

During the classroom teaching the teachers identify the advanced learners and adopt strategies to respond to their special educational and learning needs. In the course of teaching itself, their curiosity for more advanced level of subject knowledge is satisfied by the respective teachers. They are encouraged to raise questions of their choice in the classroom. Besides it, they are motivated by the principal and teachers to take their teachers' help even outside the classroom. The co-operative attitude of the teachers encourages the students of this category to meet and interact with the teachers whenever they feel the need to get their curiosities satisfied.

The advanced learners are shown the academic way to study advanced level books of their subjects. They are motivated to use the library resources to the optimum level. The college library has a very good collection of books and journals. These are of immense help to the advanced learners of the college.

Based on the academic needs of such students, teachers hold some special classes to discuss their queries and remove their doubts.

The advanced learners are advised to raise questions of their choice whenever subject experts' lectures are organised.

Such students are also advised to visit library of the lead college and the university library. They are also encouraged to interact with eminent professors who can be helpful with their knowledge in different subjects. In commerce, after teaching by the faculty, if some students unable to understand numerical, the advanced students are invited to explain those numerical to the weaker students.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided) ?

The college is always concerned with its objective that each and every student, once admitted to any course/programme offered by it, completes his/her course of study with high marks and admirable performance in extra-curricular activities.

During the classroom teaching and tests academically weaker students are identified by the teachers. The needs of such learners are taken care of through various government provisions that are in place here with desired results:

For the SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) students, subject to family income

limits, there is provision for Post-metric scholarships. These scholarships work both as incentive and help in continuing their studies over the allotted time of the courses/programmes the students of these categories offer to study.

Besides these scholarships, there is a provision for BPL scholarships for those students who fulfil the conditions as stipulated for BPL scholarships.

In addition to the above scholarship provisions, the college has a fund at its disposal called Poor Students Fund. From this fund very poor students of the college get financial help.

As regards helping the physically challenged students to keep their study continuing, the college has ramps in adequate numbers which make the campus easy-to-move for them. Besides, the staff members of our college behave with them keeping in mind the dignity of such students, so that they never feel discouraged in any manner.

The needs of the slow learners are taken care of adequately. Teachers pay special attention to their questions. They are identified and, based on needs, they are taught in separate groups by the teachers. They are supplied with easy-to-understand study materials of the subjects in which they find themselves comparatively weaker. Simpler versions of subject books are recommended to them by the respective teachers.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college takes teaching as its primary duty and satisfactory learning by the students as its prime concern.

All the teachers of the college, at the beginning of each academic session, prepare their teaching plans with details about the month-wise break-up of the portions of the curriculum planned to be taught during the session. While making the teaching plans, the teachers bear in mind the fact that the most important part of their job is to transfer maximum possible amount of knowledge through the best possible communication, so that the learners receive, imbibe and retain it for their further strengthening in the course of their higher courses of study.

Besides such teaching plans, all the departments prepare their separate academic calendars in which they chart out the activities they perform by way of enriching the

curricular content. Special lectures, workshops, debates, quiz competitions, etc. are prominent activities. The students are provided question banks. They prepare notes on them with the help of faculty members.

Before the university annual/semester end examinations, internal tests are conducted to evaluate the learning outcomes of the teaching work performed by the teachers.

In the form of smaller efforts with the purpose to gauge the interest and the level of reception of the taught things, the teachers conduct oral tests in which the students are tested.

At the end of the teaching of each unit of the curriculum, unit tests are conducted to get the idea of how much of the unit-knowledge has been received by the students. The quarterly, Half-Yearly and Model Tests are also arranged for the assessment of students.

The final term-end examinations are conducted by the affiliating university at the college under the supervision and invigilation of the college staff.

As applicable in some subjects, evaluation of applied nature is also practiced in the form of project preparation and data collection.

Practical examinations are conducted by external experts in science subjects to evaluate students in the laboratories of respective subjects.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college contributes to the teaching-learning process through calling upon the faculty members to apply new methods in different subject areas, advising the teachers to enrich their teaching work for better results, trying for the enrichment of the library resources, organizing quality awareness programmes like lectures/ workshops on the subject.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students

Effective teaching is the theme that is under constant emphasis in this college. The goal of effective teaching can be achieved only when the students are at the centre of the teaching work. All possible efforts are made by the teachers to make the learning process student-

centric.

The teachers are eager to acquaint themselves with newer methods of teaching and learning through their participation in seminars and workshops.

The teachers try, as far as possible, to do interactive teaching in the classroom. The students are encouraged to involve themselves attentively in the teaching-learning process.

The teachers do the teaching work starting from the simple to the complex portions of the curriculum.

As far as support structures for the teachers to develop their teaching skills are concerned, they are supported by the college administration in developing such skills. They are motivated by the principal, and whenever needed, are relieved to participate in various courses organized by outside institutions.

The college has internet connectivity through which the teachers can use eresources.

The college has LCD projector that is used in teaching work.

Some departments take their students on educational tours and excursions.

Teachers, who belong to 'sister' departments like Commerce and Economics, History and Political Science, Botany and Zoology Maths and Physics, interact among themselves on the possible areas of subject interaction for effective teaching.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

This institution believes in the idea that the ultimate purpose of education is to bring out the inherent potential of critical thinking and creativity in the learners. The teachers, through their hard academic work and commitment to the pursuit of knowledge, try to be role models for their students.

They encourage the students to study hard and dare to evaluate, criticize and form independent opinions about the things learnt, based on convincing thinking and argumentation.

Cramming is discouraged. The teachers, in the course of classroom teaching, emphasize the fact that true knowledge is that which is acquired through deep comprehension and relevant application. Such knowledge spurs creative and critical thinking.

To achieve the purpose of developing critical and creative thinking capacity of the students the faculty members, where applicable, give them tasks such as making projects on their own, writing creative pieces and speaking on given topics.

The college organises Book Reading Day on September 8 every year. This is part of the reading culture which the college wants to foster and nurture among the staff and students. Love for books and new ideas, is inculcated among the students, so that they remain learners throughout their life. The college has a separate library building with sufficient space in its reading room. Under the control and supervision of a very experienced librarian the library resources are very helpful in building a reading culture which has the potential to turn the students of the college into life-long learners.

Efforts are made to keep the general academic atmosphere of the college conducive to the development and nurture of scientific temper. The need to keep away from superstition and to adopt an objective, experimental and scientific approach to issues of life is emphasised in formal and informal discussions and debates.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

With the available resources and functioning optimally within the constraints of the infrastructure available, the college is committed to its objective of effective teaching. Our college utilises the NMEICT programme to make sure that every student and faculty has access to e-resources. These e-resources prove to be very helpful for the faculty members for effective teaching and students for easy understanding.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The teachers of this college are eager to update their knowledge. They participate in seminars and workshops organised by different institutions. They also motivate the students to participate in such academic programmes.

The departments of the college organise expert lectures that also prove to be helpful in exposing the faculty and students to advanced level of knowledge.

The library resources of the college, both in the form of books and journals as well as e-resources expose the faculty and students to the advanced level of knowledge.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling / mentoring /academic advise) provided to students?

The faculty and administration of the college are always willing and ready to support and guide the students to make their college-life rewarding and fruitful. The faculty advises and guides the students in choosing subjects of study, to make them aware about the difficulties in the offered subjects and strategy to solve those difficulties, in maintaining self-confidence and self-esteem, to make them aware about the need of quality in education.

A special programme named 'Student Life-Cycle Management' has been commenced from this session to facilitate this goal.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college has, during the last four years, purchased LCD projector to help the teachers to adopt effective innovative teaching methods in the classrooms and laboratories. The teachers, especially of the Science Faculty, use this facility in teaching.

The Science Faculty teachers focus adequately on experiments in the teaching process.

The strengths of the traditional teaching methods are also sufficiently exploited with good results. For example, blackboard work by the teachers while teaching grammar and Math and science subjects shows visible learning impact on the learners.

All the teachers try to be interactive in their classroom teaching. To overcome the flatness and dullness of lecture method, they try to keep the students attentive and alert through posing questions and encouraging them to explore the further areas of knowledge.

As needed, the teachers use pictorial aids to convey the teaching content to the students. If some students are unable to understand, the advanced students explain that on the black board to those students.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college library plays a key role in augmenting the teaching-learning process. It is equipped with internet facility which is used by the faculty and students to be benefitted by the e-resources available online. As mentioned earlier, the college subscribes to the e-resources available through the N-LIST. These resources make the library a key instrument in augmenting the teaching-learning process.

Besides the e-resources, our library regularly purchases books and subscribes to journals and newspapers for the enrichment of its academic resources.

It has a sufficiently spacious reading room where the students and faculty sit and read with concentration, leading naturally to the augmentation of the teaching-learning process.

The library maintains an archive of previous years' question papers of various examinations, which strengthens, in a way, the teaching-learning process as those question papers help the students in adopting exam-oriented study strategy to score high marks in their respective exams.

Our library is the place where all the curriculum booklets of all the subjects issued by the affiliating university are kept. This helps the faculty as well as the students in keeping themselves easily updated about the curricular contents of different subjects.

It also has Book Bank facility for underprivileged students. This facility helps their learning because under this scheme the concerned beneficiaries can keep the borrowed books for the whole academic session.

The library keeps the teachers and students updated about the new arrivals in the library stock.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Due to vacant teaching posts, the college faces challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated timeframe. But this challenge is met through the appointment of the Guest faculty in every session.

The Assistant Professors in position try their level best to satisfactorily complete the curricula within the planned timeframe. In this work the teachers appointed by the college Janbhagidari Samiti also have a role.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college follows a monitoring system regarding the teaching work performed by the teachers. Every teacher maintains Attendance Registers and Daily Teaching Diary. This diary is the record of the daily teaching work done by the teacher. Just after the end of every month, the registers and diaries are submitted to the college principal for perusal and signature. This system is effective as it ensures that every teacher does the teaching work as planned by him/her at the beginning of the session.

Periodic tests are conducted to assess the learning outcomes.

The college has recently introduced a feedback mechanism to get the evaluation of the teachers by the learners.

The college makes efforts to enhance teacher quality. The teachers are themselves quality conscious. They are motivated to participate in seminars/ conferences/workshops organized by different institutions.

During the IQAC meeting discussions the issue of teacher quality is discussed. They are called upon and motivated by the principal to keep themselves updated in their respective areas of teaching and expertise.

Those teachers who do not hold Ph.D degrees are encouraged to make the required effort in this regard, and they have registered for Ph. D degree.

Those teachers are highly appreciated whose books/papers/articles get published. Others are encouraged to make efforts in this direction.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

Being a fully government-funded institution, this college has no financial wherewithal on its own to provide research grants or financial support for research and academic publications. As far as administrative independence to allow or send the teachers to teach in other national institutions on its own is concerned, this college does not have any such administrative power. Our cadre controlling authority is the Higher Education department of Chhattisgarh government.

But the college motivates the working teachers to avail of the facilities of research grants and financial support for research and academic publications. They are also motivated to avail of the government facility of study leave.

One teacher has cleared the Research Methodology course, an essential requirement for registration for research.

This year, one professor of this college, Shri S. R. Kannoje, Assistant Professor (Zoology) received BEST TEACHER AWARD -2014 by Dalit Sahitya Academy, at Dhamtari.

Dr. Nagratna Ganveer was felicited with Sarvapalli radha Krishna Award by Anusuchit Jati Vikas Parishad, Dhamtari, C.G., Best Research Paper award in December 2011 and Ambedkar Samta Award, 2011.

This college nurtures academic excellence and always tries to give utmost importance to such work as may be recognized by external agencies. The above award was, to an extent, the result of the academic environment created, nurtured and sustained by this institution.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The college has introduced a feedback system regarding evaluation of the teachers by the students. Through it, the students are asked to give their opinions on the different aspects of the teaching done by the teachers in the classroom. The received feedback is analysed by a committee of faculty members and suggestions are made by it to improve the teaching —learning process. Suggestion box (Man ki baat) also available to provide for students and staff in the college.

The college takes effective steps to ensure that its stakeholders become aware of the evaluation process well in time.

As far as faculty is concerned, at the beginning of the academic session meeting is held to apprise them of the evaluation process. Before the beginning of the university examinations, meeting takes place to discuss and prepare for the examinations.

For the students adequate information is displayed on the notice board. At the same time, and whenever necessary, classroom announcements are also made.

The affiliating university, Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur introduced Semester System at the PG level in the year 2010-11. But at the UG level the annual system of examination prevails.

This college has not initiated any evaluation reform on its own. It follows the university provisions and instructions regarding evaluation.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college follows strictly the rules, regulations and instructions issued by the affiliating university regarding the conduct of examinations. Right from the announcement of the examination schedule through the conduct of examinations to the evaluation of answer sheets all stipulated provisions are adhered to by us.

As regard the internal evaluation, effective steps are taken in connections with it to ensure its fair conduct.

The college, during the academic session, conducts formative assessment tests like written tests and oral tests to know the learning level of the learners. At the UG level internal tests marks not added to the university results.

- Their commitment to learning increases

All internal tests are conducted periodically as stipulated in the academic calendar. Evaluated answer sheets are shown to the respective students.

At the UG level the marks obtained in the internal evaluations are not added to the university exam results.

As far as practicable, academic activities like debates, internal seminars, quiz programmes are conducted to assess and increase the students capabilities.

In a nutshell, our objectives are to produce graduates with adequate academic strength in different subjects, to give to our society such graduates who are humane, have national perspective towards issues of society, are morally strong and responsible to fellow human beings. We are committed to effective classroom teaching and providing best possible opportunities for extracurricular activities like sports and cultural activities.

The affiliating university has an effective system of re-evaluation of answer sheets. This system works as a highly potent grievance redressal mechanism in the case of those students who are not satisfied with the marks given to them in various exams conducted by the university.

In the case of any genuine problem with the question papers in examinations the grievances received from the students are forwarded to the registrar (Examinations) of the university by the principal of the college.

The unsatisfactory results were discussed with the respective faculty members and steps were taken in the direction of improving them.

Classes of different subjects are held considering the optimum utilization of the infrastructure available in the college.

Laboratory equipments are purchased as per needs of effective teaching.

Other equipments like LCD projector, xerox machines are used. Library resources are kept enriched and updated according to faculty's and students' academic needs.

Term end examinations are conducted in accordance with the university rules, regulations and instructions.

The placement sell acquaints the students of various job opportunities by organizing workshops / seminars and periodically sends eligible students to participate in campus selections organized at other institutions.

Lectures and workshops are organized to create awareness about the opportunities

and incentives to be entrepreneurs and self-employed.

The college library subscribes to employment periodicals which give information about employment opportunities.

Individual / Collaboration research activity

Three teachers have been awarded Ph.D. in the last four years and at present one teacher has applied for registration for research.

The college has one N.S.S. (National Service Scheme) unit. This unit works under the programme officer. Through this unit the college effectively promotes institutional linkage with the neighbourhood community residing in adjoining areas. The programmes and camps organized by the N.S.S. unit contribute to good citizenship, orientation towards service and holistic development among the students. The N.S.S. unit organises various programmes for motivation of the students towards taking up tasks of social service. They become, in this way, aware and prepared to play roles of social responsibility in the society. Awareness regarding good health, protection of environment, voting in elections etc., is effectively created. In every academic session seven days N.S.S. camps are organised in selected nearby villages. In these camps the participants learn and do actual works of social and community service. They perform cultural programmes, exchange ideas about social service and perform physical labour based tasks like cleaning drainages, construction of new drainages, building small infrastructure etc., besides advising the villagers regarding different aspects of healthy and prosperous life.

The college has a unit 'College Youth Redcross'. This unit works actively in providing Male and Female doctor for meeting the health demands of students; it organizes blood donating camps, helps in identifying blood group of students.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

There is no institutional mechanism as such to track students' involvement in various social movements or activities which promote citizenship roles. But the students do participate in various movements like SVEEP programme for voter awareness, Blood Donation Camps etc.

The students participate in celebration of various International and national days like Ozone day, AIDS day, Yoga day, Teachers day, Hindi day, 'Aazadi ke Sattar Saal – Yaad karo Kurbani' etc.

The students have to provide details about their involvement in social and constructive activities outside the college when they are to get the 'C' certificate for NSS activities. Students learn about these things through their participation in N.S.S. and Red Cross activities. As mentioned earlier through N.S.S. programmes and camps the students remain in scheduled contact with their respective unit heads They learn and do works which definitely promote good citizenship roles, because the purpose of N.S.S. and Red Cross units of the college is to train the students for becoming morally active and responsible citizens of society.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The college comes to know about the stakeholders' perception about our performance through parents -teachers meet. Besides it, the college invites the alumni, the guardians of students and other important members of society to express their opinions about our overall performance as an institution of higher education.

In 2012-13 the college organised its Silver Jubilee celebration programme. On this occasion a large number of people, who had some connection with the college attended the programmes related to occasion and expressed their perceptions regarding the college.

There is a 'Janbhagidari Samiti' (Public Patricipation Committee) under the chairmanship of Shri Atul Raijada, Samiti has nominated members who belong to different sections of the society. This Committee meets according to stipulated schedule for discussing the problems faced by the institution and suggests solution to them.

We maintain a Visitor's Diary in which we receive the comments regarding us from important persons who come to our college for giving lectures as resource persons or eminent visitors.

The college organises its extension and outreach programmes through its NSS unit.

The college has one N.S.S. unit.

N.S.S. programme officer is appointed by the principal from amongst the faculty members. The programme officer motivates the students to join N.S.S. unit and works actively to train them for learning and participating in the organised activities.

The programme officer enrolls the students as N.S.S. Volunteers and from amongst them selects some as group leaders. The N.S.S. unit charts out programmes/activities/camps for the whole academic session which is communicated to the staff and students. Efforts are made to promote the participation of students and staff in the charted out programmes/activities.

The members of staff are invited on the inauguration and conclusion days of the organized programmes and camps to contribute to the learning of socially useful activities by the participating student Volunteers.

There is adequate budget provision for the extension programmes. During the programmes/camps wholesome food and refreshment are given to the volunteers.

On National days like Independence Day and Republic Day the NSS officer and volunteers organize special programmes to enhance the grandeur of these occasions.

There is a YRC unit in the college. It organizes Blood donation camps, arranges lectures on health and Hygiene, arranges for weekly visits by male/female doctors for free consultancy, and also provides free basic medicines.

There is a provision under the NSS extension programmes to adopt one village in each academic session for upliftment and improvement of the conditions there. For such adoption, a sort of survey about the concerned village residents is done, and on the basis of that survey one village dominated by weaker sections is selected for NSS extension work.

For example, in the academic session 2014-15, the nearby village named Bagtarai and session 2015-16 village named Sonsaytola (Ambagarh Chouki) were selected, and in the current session 2016-17 village Rampur, Block Dongargaon has been selected. Such special extension programmes benefit the selected village community in a more concentrated way through extension work.

Objectives of the college extension programmes are to make the students contribute to the betterment of the community life. Through such extension programmes the students learn and do socially relevant and important works related with the problems of the common people living in nearby areas.

Through extension programmes the students become directly aware of the various issues and problems regarding health, environment, participation in democratic processes etc. These problems form a part of the learning corpus of the students. Through these they learn and enrich their academic knowledge strength also.

As regards values and skills, they learn through extension programmes the values of social and community service and skills contributing towards their betterment. They learn the skills of health service, doing physical works and listening to the problems of the common people of society.

Well before the commencement of the activities/programmes/camps, the villagers are informed through proper channels of contact and communication like sarpanch /patel / School teachers, etc. The timing of stay and the descriptions of programmes to be organised are communicated to them. Besides, the programme officers themselves visit the concerned villages and try to convince them about the benefits of the programmes to be organised. As a result of these efforts, the people of the villages participate in our programmes and get benefitted.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college tries to create and enhance the infrastructure required for effective teaching and learning. We seek grant from the UGC and the state government. Our Janbhagidari Samiti also helps us in this regard. Our policy is to keep our available infrastructure in satisfactory condition and at the same time, make necessary additions to it. This college building is old and not spacious enough to meet the requirements of the growing number of the students.

A grant of Rs. 10000000=00 (Rs. One Crore only) has been sanctioned for new classrooms in the last state budget, from RUSA Rs. 14000000=00 (Rs. One crore forty Lakhs) has been sanctioned for eight class rooms. Rs 1000000=00 (Rs. Ten lakhs) has been sanctioned from MLA fund for Seminar Hall. Rs 10000000=00 (Rs. One crore) has been sanctioned for Auditorium by state government. For Fencing Rs 200000=00 (Rs. Two Lakhs) from MLA fund has been sanctioned. Additionally, an amount of Rs. 1000000=00 (Rs. Ten Lakhs) has been specially sanctioned for boys/girls toilet.

With increasing number of classes the infrastructural needs of the college are also being provided for by the state government, MPLAD Fund, MLA Fund and local bodies development fund.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.
- Classrooms: the college has fourteen (14) classrooms.
- Technology enabled learning spaces: One (01) classroom and one (01) laboratory have been developed as smart learning-teaching spaces with facilitating equipments and teaching learning aids.
- Seminar hall –The seminar Hall for the college is under construction.

- Tutorial spaces There is separate tutorial space in the college.
- Laboratories There are five (05) laboratories (Physics, Chemistry, Zoology,
 Botany and Computer Science) in the college.
- Botanical garden The college is developing a botanical garden which is maintained by the students.
- Animal house There is **no** animal house in the college.
- Specialized facilities etc. The college has no specialized facilities for the following purposes but
 - 1. The teaching- learning is done in the available classrooms and laboratories with the present teaching aids and equipments.
 - **2.** Interactive boards for teaching.
 - 3. Provide Career oriented programs and coaching facility.
 - **4.** Awards and incentives for merit-cum-means students.
 - **5.** Free coaching for meritorious and slow learners.
 - **6.** Financial support to disabled and poor students with the help of a fund created by the staff of the college.
- b) Extra curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.
- Sports The College has facilities for outdoor as well as indoor games.
- Outdoor games –There is sufficient space and facilities for various outdoor games like volleyball, football, cricket, kabaddi, kho-kho, and athletics.
- Indoor games There is a lack of sufficient space and facility in the form of a spacious hall for various indoor games like chess, badminton, table tennis, carom.
 Still these activities are carried out in class-rooms after regular teaching is over. All the sports activities function under the guidance and control of a sports officer.
- Gymnasium The college has at present, **no** gymnasium
- Auditorium The College has at present no separate auditorium. However, the state government has sanctioned 1.4 crore for this purpose.
- NSS, NCC The College has one NSS unit, under the guidance of a programme
 officer. The NSS unit does regular activities and organizes camps and programmes
 as per schedule. This college does not have an NCC unit.

The students take part in various cultural activities. Whenever cultural programmes are organized, musical instruments and artists trainers are invited to come to the college. The local town is very co-operative in this regard. Its cultural resources are available for the cultural programmes of the college.
- Public speaking The students are encouraged to acquire the capability for public speaking. Debates, student seminars, and group discussions and cultural programmes are organized.
- Yoga Yoga training is given in camps organised by the NSS unit of the college.
 A special Yoga training session was organized for staff members on the occasion of World Yoga Day on 21st June. The commerce department of the college also provides Yoga training once a month.
- Health and Hygiene: The College has no health care centre of its own. Only first
 aid facility is available here. The local district health centre is just a few minutes
 away from the college campus and visits of male and female Doctor are organized
 twice a month.

The college makes optimal use of the available resources. We try to keep the available resources in line with its academic growth. Keeping in view the growing number of admitted students, the college makes efforts to increase and augment the infrastructure.

During the last four years the college developed the following infrastructural facilities.

Chemistry Lab- A spacious Chemistry Lab was constructed on the first floor of the college at the cost of Rs. 7,00,000=00. The funding agency was UGC. It formed a major chunk of XI th plan building grants.

Reading Room – A separate Reading Room was constructed for the college library with

XIth plan grant of UGC. The approximate cost was about Rs. 4,00,000=00

Common Room & Toilet for Women – A Girls Common Room with attached Toilet was constructed on the first floor with XI th plan grant of UGC. The approximate cost was about Rs. 2,00,000=00

Classroom – A sum of Rs. 2,20,000 was spent on construction of class rooms during XI th plan grant of UGC.

Tiles fitting in the college premise- The Janbhagidari samiti for the college spent about Rs. 1,50,000=00 on repairing and tiles fitting in two class-rooms of the college.

Books for the library – Necessary books were added to the library corpus of the college. An amount of Rs. 5,40,494=00 was spent on it from UGC funding.

Equipments for laboratories – Required instruments were purchased for the college laboratories. An amount of Rs. 5,45,850=00 was spent on it from UGC funding.

Other Equipments- A photocopy machine, an LCD Projector and ten Green Boards were purchased through UGC grants in the last four years.

ICT Infrastructure- A sum of Rs. 3,79,781=00 was spent on procurement of computers and peripherals out of UGC grants. The self-financing Computer Science department also purchased desktops worth 2,16,572=00 during last academic session.





Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

In this college coaching classes for competitive exams are organised in few subjects. The placement cell organizes career guidance seminars for the benefit of students.

Slow learners are identified by the teachers in the course of classroom teaching and internal assessment, and given extra teaching attention through extra classes.

The library and Chemistry laboratory of the lead college Govt. Digvijai P.G. College can be utilized by the PG stdents.

Publication of student magazines

The college publishes a magazine on annual basis. This magazine carries articles/poems, etc. of the students as well as teachers.

The college organises lectures and workshops to sensitize the students toward entrepreneurial opportunities in the field of employment.

The students take part in games organised at college/district/state/national levels of sports competition.

To compensate for the academic loss due to participation in extra-curricular activities, some extra classes are held as per requirement of the concerned students. But there is no flexibility in exam schedules for the purpose.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials

Those students who take part in sports or NSS related activities are given dietary items as per rules. For participation in sports provision of uniform and sporting material is there for the college students.














5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The college follows the university calendar for annual sports activities to be organised for the students. In every academic session these sports activities are organised in the college usually in the last week of December. In the annual sport activities the students

participate in internal tournaments of cricket, volley ball, badminton, chess, slow cycling and athletics. The students are ranked on the basis of their performance and the selected students are awarded at on the occasion of the annual function of the college.

The college has a Students Union/Council comprising of students representatives and Activities Societies. The Students Union/council comprises of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Joint Secretary along with all class representatives, This Council is formed by elections. One post of the office bearers is reserved for woman candidates and one third of the class representatives posts are reserved for woman candidates.. The Activities Societies are nominated bodies. These Societies are – Cultural society, Social work society (including Red Cross society, NSS society), Science Club, Physical Activity Society, Society on Gender Issues, Knowledge society, Current Affairs Club, Book Readers Society, Dramatics Society and Fine Arts Society. For each 'Activity Society' there is a working committee comprising of convener, co-convener and nominated members. A senior faculty member acts as professor-in-charge of the Students Union/Council and the Activities Societies.

The Students Union promotes democratic values, rights and duties among the

students, encourages intellectual, social and cultural activities in the campus, encourages students participation in literary, cultural and sports activities, extends social service through mutual co-operation among the students, supports and encourages conducive atmosphere of learning and teaching in the college.

All the faculty members and persons associated with Jan-bhagidari Samiti donate their surplus books to the college Book Bank, which helps the economically weaker students.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

The vision of this college is to strive for the upliftment of the students most of whom belong to educationally challenged background. We want to prove ourselves as a credible institution of higher education which serves the surrounding society through imparting quality education, moral values and discipline. We are committed to the our goal of producing productive, morally responsible, disciplined and intellectually vibrant citizens.

The majority of college students belong to the socially, economically and educationally weaker sections of our society. So, obviously our mission is to provide a satisfactory access to higher education for these students.

We also work, through our various academic and cultural activities, for the all round development of the personality of our students.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

This college is a government institution. Therefore, the basic policies and plans are framed at the level of the Higher Education Department of the C.G. government This college implements those policies and plans through the allocation of works to teaching and non-teaching staff members. In the implementation process, the principal as well as the entire faculty actively participate and contribute their best.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission.

The principal is the head of the institution. At the institutional level, the principal provides the administrative leadership and guidance for the effective implementation of the policies regarding quality education which is the main aim of this institution. The principal monitors the academic work done by the teachers through observing carefully

the attendance and daily teaching registers maintained by the faculty each month. The principal keeps on motivating all the teaching and non-teaching staff members in the direction of achieving the mission of the college. The principal presides over the staff Council meetings and apprise them of the different functions to be carried out by different staff members.

At the beginning of each academic session, the principal forms different committees comprising of senior and junior teachers for the various tasks related with the proper functioning of the college as an institution of quality higher education provider.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

The administrative leadership calls meetings of the college staff council and during these the steps regarding effective all round working of the institution throughout the session are discussed. Thereafter, through different committees various academic and co-curricular duties are allocated to the teachers.

For special occasions like jubilee celebrations and annual functions, meetings for planning the events are called and presided by the principal.

• Interaction with stakeholders

The principal interacts with teachers and students whenever the need arises. Besides, there is a structured mechanism of college staff council through which the principal interacts with all the teaching and non-teaching staff members of the college. As far as the students are concerned; the principal interacts with them through the office bearers of the students union. The principal interacts with individual students also as and when any need arises.

From time to time the principal interacts with students' guardians to discuss the issues related with their wards.

On some occasions the principal interacts with the alumni and the former faculty of the college to elicit their views regarding the institution.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

The principal takes full interest and provides proper support in the effective functioning

of each sphere of the college. Through individual and group meetings with the faculty members the principal takes stock of the existing situation and analyses the needs for further improvement in the different departments of the college. The principal motivates for taking up research work by the faculty and is prompt in providing administrative support for the same. The principal is accessible to different stakeholders and supports reasonable and acceptable proposals and suggestions put forward by them in the interest of the college.

• Reinforcing the culture of excellence

The principal constantly emphasizes the need of excellence in the college, and gives guidance toward the reinforcement of the culture of excellence in the working of this institution. The principal diligently monitors the working of all the staff members of the college so that they contribute their best to the creation and advancement of such culture.

• Champion organisational change

The principal works towards better organisational change and tries to get new courses introduced for the benefits of the learners of the college. During her tenure B.Com. and B.A. courses were introduced. PG level courses in two subjects- Chemistry and Mathematics & PGDCA have been approved by the government. These programmes has been introduced from the academic session 2016-17. A new office building, a chemistry laboratory and a reading room as well as a boundary wall for the campus have also been constructed during her tenure.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The government policies and plans are fully implemented by the college, and the effective implementation is monitored through established government procedures and mechanisms. The teaching work of the faculty is monitored through attendance and daily teaching registers maintained by them.

Staff Council meetings are held at the commencement of each academic session as well as when a need arises.

Committees for various extra-curricular and co-curricular activities are constituted in each academic session.

Students' Union office bearers meet the principal and respective committees to discuss issues regarding the institutional improvement of the college.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The principal provides academic leadership and guidance to the faculty with the purpose of increasing their academic potential. The principal motivates them for taking up research work in their respective subjects besides monitoring their academic work.

The principal is the chairperson of the IQAC of the college, and he presides over its meetings in which he motivates for taking up and performing better and better academic work.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college forms various committees whose charge is given to different faculty members and given freedom to take decisions regarding their respective work.

The Students Union elections are held every year in the college in accordance with the instructions of the Hon. Supreme court of India. This union grooms democratic leadership at the students' level.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system ?

The different departments work under their respective heads under the overall control of the institutional head. The Heads of the Departments have autonomy to allocate work to other teachers and non teaching staff of their departments.

Different functions are carried out by various committees constituted by the principal.

The Principal and all the teachers work for effective functioning of the college. Various functions of the college are performed through the respective committees and cells.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

This college has a quality policy which is stated in our vision and mission statements. The policy is to impart quality education to our learners in the best possible way and to ensure their all round development through different academic and co-curricular activities.

The college is an affiliated college, so it follows the curricular content of the various subjects as designed by our affiliating university. We teach the curriculum in an effective way and support our teaching through various co-curricular activities like classroom seminars, debates, etc.

Though the college does not have the syllabus preparation power of its own and does not review the university-provided syllabus, it tries to prepare short-term courses for the students.

Our prime institutional policy is to ensure imparting of quality education to the students. For this we organise quality- related awareness, enhancing programmes like lectures and workshops.

The faculty members plan their teaching work in a planned and systematic way. The head of the institution monitors the teaching work through monthly perusal of the attendance and daily teaching registers maintained by the faculty members.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making

processes.

The principal is the head of the institution. There is no Vice-Principal's post.

On the administrative side, the head clerk is in charge of the college office and its personnel like clerks and peons. The office works under the overall control of the principal.

On the academic side, each department works under its respective head. Each Science department has a Lab Technician and a Lab Attendant to look after scientific equipments and apparatus.

Decision making process of the college in focused on the strict implementation of government rules, regulations and instructions. On the administrative side, the decisions are taken by the principal in accordance with the rules and regulations of the government. Other decisions related to academic matters, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, library and sports are taken by the principal in consultation with the concerned committees and individuals. Some decisions are taken in the meetings of staff council. To utilize the Janbhagidari funds for the development of the college, the Janbhagidari chairperson and members take decisions in their meetings.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

• Teaching & Learning

The faculty members are motivated to increase their knowledge and teaching skills through participation in seminars and workshops.

The principal monitors the teaching work of the teachers through checking every month the attendance and daily teaching registers maintained by them.

Periodical tests are taken to assess the impact of teaching on the learning process of the students.

Library resources have been strengthened through addition of e-resources facility.

• Research & Development

Faculty members send research proposals concerning their subjects to UGC for approval. They are encouraged to take up research work.

• Community engagement

Our college has an NSS unit. Through this unit the college regularly engages itself with the nearby community. Every session, camps are organised in nearby villages to render community service related with health, hygiene and cleanliness.

The college has a Red Cross unit also. Through this the college engages with health related community service like blood donation.

Human resource management

The college human resources are the prime asset through which the mission of the college can be achieved. The teaching and non-teaching staffs are constantly motivated by the college administration to upgrade themselves and contribute their best towards betterment of the institution.

Industry interaction

There is no industry interaction.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution ensures that all the necessary information reaches the concerned stakeholders in a proper and clear way. The college website, notice board, prospectus are some of the important means through which the college makes the necessary information available to the stakeholders.

Different information and facts are made available to the H.E. department of the state government and the lead college through correspondence with letters and through e-mails. Whenever necessary, information is also communicated through newspaper reports.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

This college is a government college with full government funding. The government issues instructions to be followed by the college and they are followed in letter and spirit through the involvement of the staff members. Different committees are constituted by

the principal for improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional functioning.

The college has a Janbhagidari samiti to look after the contributions of students and local community towards betterment of the institution. In the meetings of this samiti important decisions are taken to strengthen the college functioning, like infrastructural development and appointment of teachers for one session. The principal is the member – secretary and one senior faculty member is professor-in-charge of the Samiti matters.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The college is a government institution and there is no management council as such. As mentioned earlier, there is a Janbhagidari Samiti here which takes decisions regarding infrastructural development and one-session appointment of teachers. In every session such teachers are appointed against vacant posts.

Last year the Janbhagidari Samiti took several decisions to repair, maintain and improve the infrastructure of the college through its own funds. The decisions have been implemented as per the resolutions of the committee.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The affiliating university has the provision for according autonomy status to the affiliated colleges.

But this college has not yet applied for obtaining the status of autonomy.

The college has a grievance redressal cell and a complaint box is installed in the campus. Stakeholders are free to put their grievances and complaints which are promptly addressed and redressed. The stakeholders can also put their complaints and grievances through oral interactions with the principal and faculty. All grievances are attended to properly.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No court cases have been filed by the college or against it by any person.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

From the session 2013-14, a student feedback system has been introduced regarding the class-room performance of the teachers. The Principal and senior members analyse the collected feedback.

The student union of the college gives its feedback about the overall functioning of the college through meetings and oral interactions with the college administration, which is analysed. The feedback is beneficial for improving the institutional performance.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The college makes efforts to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. The teachers are encouraged and relieved from college duties to participate in Orientation / Refresher courses, and for attending seminars / conferences and workshops and presenting papers there.

Special Lectures organized for the students delivered by senior faculty members from other institutions also benefit the faculty.

For the non-teaching staff a one-day training programme on office work and laboratory management was organised by the lead college; in which members of our staff participated.

College organized one day workshop on salary, pension & leave rules, TDS, purchase rule under RUSA programme.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college provides encouraging and motivating work environment for the staff members. The work culture of the college is conducive to satisfactory performance by them. The college administration sympathetically considers the genuine personal problems of the staff members, so that they find themselves at ease and contribute their best to the betterment of the institutional functioning.

The faculties are encouraged and motivated to complete the government requirement regarding their promotion and getting higher pay scales.

The faculty's research proposals are promptly forwarded to the approving agency. They are given responsibilities through inducting in committees in accordance with their interest and expertise.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Mainly there is the state government appraisal system of the teaching and non-teaching staff in the form of Annual Confidential Reports. The reports are written by the principal and reviewed by the higher authority. For the faculty UGC appraisal based reports (PBAS) are in vogue in which the entire range of academic and co-curricular activities of the faculty are appraised by the principal and reviewed by the higher authority.

Besides the above system, a monthly appraisal is in practice as regards the faculty. Every teacher has to maintain student attendance and daily teaching diaries which the principal checks and signs every month. This gives the principal an idea about whether the teaching work is being done as planned or not.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

According to the process instructed by the government, the staff members whose performance is found to be below average are communicated through correspondence that their performance has been found to be below average. An explanation is sought from them and they are encouraged to abide by the rules; repeated offenders are warned and penal provisions are invoked as per procedure.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff?

What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The welfare schemes in practice for class III and class IV staff includes salary advance for purchase of grains and celebration of festivals like Diwali etc. These advances are given once in a year and are deducted from salary every month in installments. The staff members are also provided a medical allowance every month for their medical expenses. More than 90% class three and class four staff have availed these facilities.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

It is a government college. All the appointments are made by the Higher Education department of Government of Chhattisgarh through Public Service Commission examination. We try our best to provide amiable and academically vibrant environment to the faculty and other staff members who serve here.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college has both internal as well as external system of monitoring for effective and efficient use of our financial resources. Two faculty members one each from the department of commerce & Economics check cash book entries through tallying the entries with the related receipts. The Higher Education department of the state government and the Accountant General of Chhattisgarh also send their audit staff for auditing the college finances from time to time.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college has both internal as well as external system of monitoring for effective and efficient use of our financial resources.

Internal Audit Mechanism-

A faculty members of commerce & Economics checks cash book entries through tallying the entries with the related receipts.

External Audit Mechanism-

The Higher Education department of the state government and the Accountant General of Chhattisgarh also send their audit staff for auditing the college finances from time to time.

The Accountant General of Chhattisgarh sent their audit staff for auditing the college finances on 26th November to 29th November 2012. They found just three objections and all resolved.

The Higher Education department of the state government had audited the accounts from 3rd April 2008 to 8th April 2008 and found one objection which has not been resolved.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of our funding are receipts from the state government of Chhattisgarh and UGC. Some part of the financial requirement is met with the funds available with our Janbhagidari Samiti.

Audit report of the departmental audit team and Accountant General of the state is enclosed with this report. The audit report of Janbhagidari funds collected during the last four years is also enclosed. During these years the UGC grant related income &expenditure have been audited and the utilization certificate has been sent to the UGC (CRO, Bhopal). The IQAC has two members of students union and one alumnus as its members. They attend meetings and take part in deliberations.

The meetings of the IQAC are chaired by the principal. Some of the faculty members are in the IQAC as members. From the administrative staff side, the senior clerk of the office is also a member. All these staff members attend the IQAC meetings. Remaining staff members are communicated about the meeting decisions and instructed by the principal to follow and implement them.

The constitution of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college functions as an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The principal, as the chairperson of the IQAC, chairs its meetings and guides and motivates the entire staff to be aware and active regarding quality maintenance and enhancement in the college. The principal ensures that the administrative support for the academic activities is available readily. Besides the principal, the senior clerk, who is incharge of the office work, is also present in its meetings. Thus the academic and administrative sides of the college work in tandem for the maintenance and increase of quality in the college.

Fortunately, this institution is located at a place which is naturally endowed with greenery and is located near gifts of nature like a lake and a nature park.

• Energy Conservation

Our energy requirement is fulfilled by government electricity supply which is quite satisfactory. All the staff members are fully aware that energy must be saved. We try to keep the institutional consumption of electricity at the minimum possible level by our alertness about the need of energy conservation. The college ensures that no waste of electric energy takes place in the campus. All electricity—consuming facilities and equipments are switched off when not in use. The college sensitizes the students and staff regarding the need of energy conservation. The NSS units of the college organize awareness programmes regarding energy conservation during their camp periods in nearby villages.

Most of our students belong to the nearby rural area. They come to the college on bicycles. This has a salutary effect on energy conservation because it saves students and the campus environment from the ill-effects of the burning of fossil fuels.

• Use of renewable energy

At present this college does not use any renewable energy.

• Water harvesting

We have water harvesting system in our college.

Check dam construction

There is no check dam in the college.

• Efforts for Carbon neutrality

Most of the students use bicycles for coming to the college, which is a carbon-neutral mode of transport.

• Plantation

The college does regular plantation work. In the month of August-September every session plantation work is taken up in the college campus. The planted saplings are taken care of through proper watering by the students and staff members. A botanical garden is being developed with the help of NSS volunteers.

• E-waste management

The waste water from the nearby drainage is used to water the play ground and plants of the college.

Second Practice: Garden of Medicinal Plants

1. Title of Practice

Garden of Medicinal Plants

In today's jig—jag life style, a person is bound to have a lot of health problems, forcing him or her to visit frequently to the doctors and hence the individual has to bear accountable loss of money and time. The excess and prolonged intake of various medicines is liable to produce harmful side effects which may create new problems entangling a person amongst doctor, medicine, tension, anxiety and loss of money. It is well known from historic times that there are a number of plants available nearby which cure effectively a lot of medical problems without side effects at a very low expenses, and at the same time to enhance the understanding of students regarding the study of plants. Keeping this in mind, the college developed a Garden of Medicinal Plants and planted a variety of Medicinal Plants in the campus itself to provide a valuable knowledge to the students, staff and citizens and to get benefitted from the these Medicinal Plants.

2. Goal

To provide a valuable knowledge of various properties of Medicinal Plants to the students, staff and citizens, to get benefitted from these Medicinal Plants, and cure most of the common diseases without side effects and thus avoid frequent visits to the doctors and live a peaceful life.

3. Context

Most of the persons are suffering from one or other disease and spend their time and money by visiting the doctors. The prescribed allopathic medicines, many a time produce side effects which in turn create a new problem, in other words – a cycle of problems. We know that many plants have medicinal properties but we rarely use them to cure medical problems.

It is well thought by the college that if we provide some additional inputs regarding the medicinal properties of the plants available nearby to the students, staff and citizens, it will be of great help to the them and at the same time quenches the sentiments of staff and students of college as far as the thought 'pay back to the society' is concerned.

4. The Practice

The college has developed Medicinal Garden in the campus. All the activities like arrangement of seeds, plants, fertilizers, tools and tackles, watering facilities, selection of medicinal plants have been done by the students and staff with great enthusiasm. Help from local experts has also been sought. The college has sowed initially following

- ::: Medicinal plants ::: –

- (1) **Tulasi** Tulasi is a multi utility plant, used to cure a number of diseases including cough, cold, fever, T.B., snake-bite. It gives oxygen all the 24 hours and it is also an important plant for religious purpose.
- (2) **Papita -** Papita is useful in piles, constipation, improves immune system, bones and eye-sight.
- (3) **Lemon-grass** It is used to cure joint-pain, diarrhea and malaria.
- (4) **Aloe-vera** It is useful in skin problems, piles, healing of wounds, constipation and sooths and reduces burning of wounds. It is also an antibacterial.

- (5) **Dhatura** It gives relief in the cases of asthma and swelling of respiratory tube, stiffness of joints and cramp.
- (6) **Gudhal** It removes the ailments of blood, cures the diseases of urinary –tube, nutritious for heart and makes the fetus child strong during pregnancy.
- (7) **Satawar** It is helpful in removing weakness, strengthen heart and improves the sexual strength.
- (8) **Pattarchatta** It cures pain of ears, removes stones from intestine, helpful in asthama, high blood pressure, cancer and heart diseases.
- (9) **Dhania -** It is helpful in cough, cold, fever, indigestion and cataract.
- (10) **Kaner** All parts of this plant are poisonous. The plant is used to make insecticides and rat-killing preparations.
- (11) **Gainda** The plant is used to cure malaria, phyleria, blood –sugar, stones in stomach, piles, sexual diseases and contraction of muscles.
- (12) Anwala It makes lever, bones and veins strong. It cures acidity and vomiting.It is used for making various nutritous preparations.
- (13) **Harra** This plant is used to cure old and recurring wounds, swelling and mouth ulcers and empowers heart.
- (14) **Ashwagandha** it is very vital medicinal plant and used to cure a number of diseases such as arthritis, weakness, leprosy, wounds, burning sensation and swelling. It empowers muscles and strengthens sexual power.
- (15) **Pudina -** It helps in digestive problems and pain related to arthritis.
- (16) **Munaga** It makes strong bones, purifies blood, lowers blood sugar level, eases respiratory system and is good for pregnant women.
- (17) **Kochai** It is power booster, cough deterrent and vermicide.
- (18) **Jimikand** It cures skin problems, good source of vitamin B6 and good for respiratory system, cancer deterrent and it is antioxidant.

- (19) **Charota -** It reduces the ill effects of flourosis and cures skin problems.
- (20) **Bel** It is useful in old and chronic diarrhea, boosts appetite and digestive system and is used for preparation of sweat drinks and gum.
- (21) **Thuhar** It is useful in asthama and ear-pain. It is also used to cure wounds of animals.
- (22) **Kalmegh** It is useful in curing worms, typhoid, indigestion, diarrhea, and itching.
- (23) **Bargad** As a medicine, it is used to solve problems related to skin, fever, diarrhea, healing of wounds and arthritis.
- (24) **Nimboo** It is a multi utility plant and useful in curing troubles related to stomach, itching and sun stroke . It is vermicide and a strong source of vitamin C.
- (25) **Butch** It is an insecticide and vermicide, useful in diarrhea, asthama, and to boost appetite.
- (26) **Arjun** It is useful and good for heart, fever, broken bones and inner injuries.


